ROM THE SUPERINTENDENT: Hard to believe we are winding down the basketball season and ready to start the spring sports. Where does the time go? Child Find: Bruning-Davenport USD will hold a Child Find meeting on March 9, 2020, at 6:15 PM in the Bruning library, in an effort to obtain the earliest possible identification of young children and their families who may benefit from early intervention or education services. Child Find is a component of <u>Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)</u> that requires states to identify, locate, and evaluate all children with disabilities, aged birth to 21, who are in need of early intervention or special education services. If you have concerns regarding your child's development, please come to the meeting where we can provide you with contact information for support in speech therapy, occupational therapy, and physical therapy.

Option Enrollment: March 15^{th} is the deadline for submitting option enrollment papers to the option district without restrictions. After the March 15^{th} deadline, a waiver must be signed by the resident school district unless you move into a district and wish to option out to another district.

Bruning-Davenport USD has much to offer students. The District offers a strong academic program that includes access to dualcredit courses from the University of Nebraska Now program, Southeast Community College, and Peru State College. This has been utilized by a number of students to earn college credits at vastly reduced tuition fees and the possibility to enter college as a second semester freshman. In addition we are a member of a career academy, in partnership with Southeast Community College, offering students dual credit courses in areas of education, health services, technology, and agriculture.

Bruning-Davenport USD has an experienced staff and offers a wide selection of courses to meet Rule 10 requirements. OFFICIAL MINUTES OF THE REGULAR UNIFIED SCHOOL BOARD MEETING - The Unified Board of Education met in Davenport on February 10, 2020. Pursuant to laws and notices posted in Bruning and Davenport, all proceedings were taken while convened meeting was open to the public. President Mike Schroeder called the meeting to order at 7:31 pm. Unified members present were Jerry Baysinger, Dan Domeier, Jamie Koch, and Sarah Bolte. Local board members present were Ryan Miller, Sheri Norder, Rod Tegtmeier, and Brad Williams. Also present were Superintendent Kolin Haecker, Principal Damen Kugel, Sara Dierking, Rick Ault, Jill Catlet, and David Lee.

Dan Domeier made the motion to excuse the absence of Unified Board Member Jeff Hoins, seconded by Jerry Baysinger.

President Schroeder recognized the Open Meeting Act and welcomed guests.

David Lee shared his interest in eSports as being a sponsored sport at Bruning-Davenport and presented survey information.

The Consent Agenda included the agenda, minutes of January 13, 2020 Unified Board meeting, Treasurer's Report and February claims. Sarah Bolte moved to approve the Consent Agenda as presented and Domeier seconded the motion. Roll call vote carried 5-0.

Principal Kugel gave his report on the following items: PK-12 enrollment, Preschool projection, staff celebrated I Love Public Schools Day, UNK Wind Ensemble, Steering Committee update and concluded his report with upcoming events.

Superintendent Haecker reported on information pertaining to: Results of Mudecas Speech Meet, shared a letter addressed to the York City Council from the CRC Superintendents, wrestling numbers for grades 8-12 for the 2020-2021 school year, reelection to the Bruning-Davenport School board, Legislature update, and also the Nutrition Audit in February.

Discussion items:

- A. Discussion was made regarding continuing the use of the Inter-Local agreement w/Jefferson County on attendance under FERPA.
- B. Discussion was made adding eSports as a sponsored sport at Bruning-Davenport, and it was determined that additional information is needed for further consideration.

New Business (All motions require a roll call vote and all carried 5-0 unless noted.)

- A. Jamie Koch made the motion to approve the senior overnight trip to Granby Ranch Ski Resort in Colorado, seconded by Bolte.
- B. Motion was made by Domeier to approve FFA State convention overnight trip to Lincoln, April 1-3. Baysinger seconded the motion.
- C. Bolte made the motion, second by Domeier, to approve the FCCLA State Convention overnight trip to Lincoln and hotel expenses April 5-7.
- D. Motion to approve Bruning State Bank and Cornerstone Bank as designated financial institutions for Bruning-Davenport USD was made by Domeier, seconded by Koch.
- E. Domeier moved to approve Hebron Journal- Register as the designated local paper for publications, seconded by Bolte.
- F. Koch motioned to approve the Inter-Local Agreement with Jefferson County and authorizing Superintendent Haecker to sign the agreement. Motion was seconded by Baysinger.
- G. Bolte moved to approve the resignations of Berdon Pedersen as Maintenance and Transportation director, and Ms. Happel as the 4th Grade teacher at the end of this school year. Domeier seconded the motion.
- H. Motion was made by Domeier to approve the hires of Daniel Boshart (Social Studies & Junior High football), Melinda Holeman (K-12 Special Education in Bruning), and Jill Schroeder (5-8 Science & 2-8 PE in Davenport). Motion was seconded by Baysinger. (Vote 4-0, with Michael Schroeder abstaining)
- I. Baysinger moved to approve the Negotiated Settlement with the BDEA; raising the base by \$600.00 with 3 personal days and 9 sick days. Motion was seconded by Domeier. (Vote 4-0, with Schroeder abstaining)
- J. Domeier made the motion seconded by Baysinger, to enter executive session to discuss the administration's compensation package and "to prevent needless injury to an individual" at 8:40 pm. Baysinger motioned, seconded by Domeier to come out of executive session at 9:03 pm. Motion was made by Koch to approve the Principal's compensation package by \$3,000.00 (3.3%) increase. Seconded by Domeier.

Schroeder adjourned the meeting at 9:05 pm.

Excellent attendance

Being in school every day means your child won't miss out on learning. Try to schedule appointments and family trips outside of school hours. If he asks to stay home "just because," remind him of what he'll miss, such as his reading group or PE class. Explain that he can be absent only if he's sick or if there's a family emergency.



Children who regularly eat meals with their families tend to do bet-

ter in school and avoid risky behavior. Eating dinner together is great, but other meals count, too. If you work at night, maybe you could make time for a family breakfast. Or on a weekend, try a picnic lunch.

Celebrate progress

Suggest that your youngster create a fun reminder of all the things she has accomplished. Let her cover a box with construction paper and label it "I did it!" Then, she can write each success ("I learned to add fractions") on a slip of paper and put it in the box. If she's feeling discouraged, have her read the slips.

When you think of parent involvement, do you picture moms and dads volunteering in classrooms? That's one way to help—but research shows that supporting your child's education at home is even more important. Here are conversation starters that will help you stay involved.

"Let's see what you brought home."

Look at completed work to find out what your youngster is learning and how well she's doing. You could comment on her math work or social studies project, for instance. ("You know a lot about our state's history!") Also, respond to notes from her teacher, and sign her weekly folder or daily planner if required.

"Show me what you have for homework."

It's your child's job to do her homework, but you play a role, too. Make sure she knows what she's supposed to do by having her explain the assignments to you. After she finishes her homework, glance over the work to see that it's complete.

"Describe a book you enjoyed today."

This gives you an idea of what your youngster prefers to read. Then, build a daily reading habit by asking what she'd like to read tonight. Encourage her reading and listening skills by reading aloud to her and letting her read to you.

"Tell me what you learned that you'd like to know more about."

Use her interests as jumping-off points for activities to share. If she likes geometry, you might hunt for

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shapes together. If she's fascinated by how animals adapt to winter, take her to the library to research the subject or to the zoo to see live animals.♥

After-school questions

Asking "How was school today?" might not get you far. Instead, ask questions like these for a better picture of your youngster's day:

• "What's the coolest thing that happened today?"

• "Pretend you're the teacher. How would you describe

What does respect look like?

Your youngster's daily dealings with adults and kids alike will be more pleasant if he speaks and acts respectfully. Try these tips for helping him learn about respect.

Respectful replies. Think about something that you and your youngster disagree on (say, whether his video game time should be limited). Model having a respectful discussion about it. You might say that his brain and body are growing and that he needs to run and

play to stay healthy. Then, suggest a respectful response, such

A reading challenge

By reading more complex books, your child can learn new words, facts, and ideas. He'll also be exposed to more complicated plots and will grow as a reader. Share these suggestions:

• Knowing something about the topic or setting makes a tougher book easier

to comprehend. If your youngster is reading a novel set in China, he could talk

to someone who has been there or look up the country online (try a children's site like kids.national geographic.com).

• Encourage your child to look at a simpler book on the same subject. A picture-book biography about Harriet Tubman may help your youngster better understand a textbook chapter on the civil rights movement, for instance.

• Suggest that your child read complicated material with pencil and paper in hand. He can jot down questions, words to look up, or facts he wants to learn more about.♥

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as, "I want to be healthy, but I love video games.' Have him brainstorm other situations where people have different opinions but still speak to each other with respect.

Everyday acts. When you mow the lawn or clean up after your dog, you can teach your child about respect for neighbors. Explain that keeping your

neighborhood clean and neat makes it nice for everyone. Ask him to think of other respectful things neighbors should do. If you share an apartment laundry room, he might say that you respect neighbors' time by removing your clothes when they're done so others get to use the washers and dryers.♥

Strong study habits

Q: My third grader has to spend more time studying this year. How can I make sure she studies effectively?

A: Set your daughter up for success by helping her find a distraction-free study spot. Also,

have her come up with a study routine. For instance, she could reserve time each evening to review her textbook and notes in the days leading up to a test.

Also, many students find it helpful to jot down a purpose each time they study. Your child might write: "I will learn the definitions of all the boldfaced words in chapter 7, section 1."

Finally, encourage her to experiment with study strategies to find what works best. She could close her eyes and imagine how a word is spelled or draw a grid with 9 squares to solve 3 x 3. Or she might find it helpful to spell or recite math facts aloud in rhythm or to a familiar tune.♥



Talking to kids about money

were always asking to buy things like dress-up shoes or new games. They didn't seem to understand that these items weren't in our budget.

I wanted them to learn about how we spend our money-and that

it is limited. So I got a spiral notebook and labeled it "Family Spending Journal." I explained that for two weeks, everyone would keep a record of what they spent money on. I listed items like my

subway fare, the electric bill, and food at the grocery store. The children wrote down expenses such as school lunch, soccer cleats, and field trip fees.

After a few days, they were surprised by how many things we needed money

for. Our kids had no idea, for example, that we paid for taxes on our income, several types of insurance, and membership in our homeowners' association. Sometimes they still ask to buy too many things at the store, but when I say no, at least they understand why.♥
