PROM THE SUPERINTENDEN: On October 9, the Nebraska Department of Education released the NSCAS (Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System) test results. The results were shared for English Language Arts and Math: Developing, On Track, and College & Career Ready Benchmark. Science scores were presented as Below the Standard, Meets the Standard, and Exceeds the Standard.

Below is a chart that provides a comparison of our students' test scores with all of Nebraska students in terms of the indicators mentioned previously. [Scores in bold indicate our students scoring above the State average.] As you can see, we continue to be strong in math, scoring higher on average than all other students taking the test for grades 3-8. Our performance on the NSCAS-ELA in grades 5-7 exceeded the State average as well.

Escape Panning

Bruning- Davenport would like to thank our local volunteer fire departments and resure units. Thank you for all that you do to keep us safe and for helping teach our children how to preactice fire safety.

Plan Ahead! If a fire breaks out in your

home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

SAFETY TIPS

- MAKE a home escape plan. Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
- NOW at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.
- HAVE an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
- PRACTICE your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.
-))) PRACTICE using different ways out.
- TEACH children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- CLOSE doors behind you as you leave.

IF THE ALARM SOUNDS...

- If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.
- If you have to escape through smoke, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.
- CALL the fire department from outside your home.

FACTS

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Install smoke alarms inside every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- According to an NFPA survey, only one of every three
 American households have actually developed and practiced a home fire escape plan.
- While 71% of Americans have an escape plan in case of a fire, only 47% of those have practiced it.
- One-third of American households who made an estimate thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life-threatening. The time available is often less. And only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out!

FIRE SAFETY: The 2nd, 3rd, and 4th graders visited the Davenport Fire Hall on October 16 to learn about fire safety. The fire-fighters discussed ways to prevent fires, how to stay safe, and what to do in case there is a fire. Students also learned about each of the fire trucks and firefighter gear and equipment.

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

First, create an FSA ID for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov. You'll need it to access and sign the FAFSA.

Review EducationQuest FAFSA Checklist for a list of items to gather before you start the form.

Complete the FAFSA at fafsa.gov. You may also complete it via the myStudentAid app for iOS and Android.

Retake the ACT and/or SAT. Colleges use your best scores for college admission and scholarships.

Get serious about applying for scholarships. See <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org for Nebraska-based scholarships and a list of national search sites.

Juniors...start researching colleges If you narrow your college choices by the end of your junior year, your senior year will be less stressful. Here's how to get started:


