ROM THE PRINCIPAL: I started the first day of school this year by getting in a 5:30 early morning walk. In the distance I could see signs of storms that were brewing; being especially enamored with all the lightning I was seeing in the distance. My attention quickly turned to getting the dog out to complete his morning routine before it started to rain (mission accomplished).

Seniors...tasks for this fall!

Senior Parents, I will be sending you an email at the beginning of September for more information. **SCHOLARSHIPS!** Senior Year, this is your year! Start early! There will be a list of scholarships available on the school website, under the counselor tab. You will want to look for scholarships on your own too. The more scholarships, the less money out of your pocket. Every senior will want to sign up for ScholarshipQuest. All of the scholarships available in Nebraska get posted here. This is another resource. With scholarships, you will need **Letters of Recommendation.** This is something that you should be asking more than two weeks before the scholarship is due, and not asked the week of the scholarship is due. Please consider planning and get them in advance.

1. Sign up for a MyEducationQuest account, if you haven't already. This will give you access to several tools including: Activities Resume, College Profiles, ScholarshipQuest, and Timelines.

Sign up for Countdown2College email service on Educationquest.org. You will learn what you should do each month to prepare for college.

Make sure you are on track to meet graduation and college admission requirements.

Mark your calendars now for our free fall virtual learning sessions!

EducationQuest will present a series of free virtual learning sessions this fall for professionals, students, and families. The sessions will be simulcast at 7 p.m. CT on YouTube and Facebook. Dates and topics are as follows:

August 31: College planning for seniors

September 21: How the financial aid process works

October 5: How to apply for financial aid

November 2: What happens after you file the FAFSA

Miss Hoffman has this information the bulletin board in the student lounge. FAFSA opens October 1. You can also register for a Financial Aid Program Scholarship!

Apply to your top college choices. <u>Bruning - Davenport High School will be hosting an APPLY2COLLEGE Event in September</u> while the rest are <u>MAPS Testing</u>. Date will be emailed and sent home at a later time. All seniors will be applying to at least one college. **Information and College Application Checklist will be mailed and emailed to parents and students.** This will help students be prepared for the event.

Create a Federal Student Aid account at <u>studentaid.gov</u> (both you and a parent will need an account). This is the site you will use to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

6. Complete the FAFSA at <u>studentaid.gov</u> on or after October 1. The FAFSA is your application for federal, state, and college-based financial aid. <u>Free tools to prepare for and complete the form are available at educationquest.org</u>, <u>Miss</u> <u>Hoffman's Bulletin Board, and will be emailed to seniors and senior parents</u>.</u>

7. Expect a student Aid Report (SAR) via an email link. The SAR acknowledges that your FAFSA was received, and informs you if you need to take further action before your FAFSA can be processed.

8. **Retake the ACT.** Colleges use your best score for college admissions and scholarship consideration. December ACT is the cut off to take for most scholarship deadlines. ACT Dates can be found in your student handbook, bulletin board in the lounge, your locker, and at <u>act.org</u>. Don't forget to use OnToCollege: John Baylor. You have an individual account.

9. Get Serious About Applying for Scholarships. See ScholarshipQuest for Nebraska-based scholarships and a list of national search sites. Miss Hoffman shared a google folder to seniors with college events and scholarships available. You also can find scholarship information on the bulletin board in the student lounge, and on the school website (bruningdavenport.org).

10. **Request Letters of Recommendations for Scholarship Applications.** Ask adults who know you well, Give them plenty of notice, A deadline, Details about the scholarship, and A copy of your Activities Resume.

Continue to apply for scholarships while you're in college.

Juniors...tasks for this fall!

1. Stay on Track to Meet College Admission Requirements. Meet with Miss Hoffman to determine what courses you will need to take. Keep in mind that college admission requirements may differ from high school graduation requirements.

2. **Take the PSAT Exam.** All Juniors will be taking the PSAT on October 12 at Bruning - Davenport. The results will determine if you qualify for a National Merit Scholarship. Juniors, make sure to sign into your On To College: John Baylor account, there is a Quick Power Prep course. This will help you become more successful.

3. Focus on Your Career Interest. Take career assessments. Miss Hoffman has shared many resources with you. Check your google drive for a folder labeled: Career Education. Explore career options of your top choice. Job Shadow your top career interest.

4. **Research Colleges That Interest You.** Talk to college reps who visit Bruning-Davenport. Make sure to check the daily bulletin to see what times and dates they will be arriving. Review college websites, and use College Profiles at EducationQuest.org to find schools that offer your desired major, location, size, and other criteria.

5. Create an Activities Resume if you haven't done so yet. Miss Hoffman has many examples. Nebraska Career Connections and EducationQuest have templates available, as well.

If you haven't already, you want to start creating your **High School Activities Resumes**. EducationQuest.org and Nebraska Career Connections have great templates, along with Microsoft Word/Google Docs. **These are very useful when applying for scholarships**. Instead of writing everything out, you can print "see attached resume." The sooner you create a resume, the less you will have to remember your senior year. If you need any help or want to look at examples, Miss Hoffman is available and has previous year resumes.

6. **Sign Up for a MyEducationQuest Account** if you haven't already. This will give you access to several tools including: Activities Resume, College Profiles, Timelines, etc. Sign up for Countdown2College email service. You will learn what you should do each month to prepare for college.

7. **Take the ACT.** Colleges use your best score for college admissions and scholarship consideration. ACT Dates can be found in your student handbook, bulletin board in the lounge, your locker, and at <u>act.org</u>.

Juniors are going to be taking the **Nebraska State ACT** in the spring. There are various other **National Test Dates** that are located in the student handbook, online school calendar, and each student will get an individual flyer. We will be utiliz-

ing **On To College: John Baylor** again this year. Each student has an individual account that is free for them to use. Students already have their usernames and passwords. Juniors will be using ACT Prep, ACT Refresher Prep, PSAT Quick Power Prep, and Study Skills & Test Taking Strategies. As we don't want to teach to the test, but higher the score equals out to be more in scholarship money. As more resources are provided for ACT Test Prep, I will share them with you. There might be a fee waiver available, you will want to talk to Miss Hoffman about your options.

9th & 10th Grade Students: Now is the time to start thinking about what career field or career cluster interests you. Some things to consider are taking Career Interest Inventories, Skills Inventories, and Personality Inventories. Miss Hoffman has a list of reliable inventories for you. Please arrange a time to meet with me. <u>NebraskaCareerClusters.com</u> offers different Nebraska Career Tours short video clips over each career pathway for students to explore and learn from professionals. These videos highlight Nebraska-based companies specifically.

<u>EducationQuest.org</u> has a resource called **Reality Check**. This will ask you a series of questions according to education, career, lifestyle, necessities, luxury items, etc. to see if you can survive according to your future salary. This is awesome for kids to explore as they are considering different careers.

Starting your Freshman year, you want to start creating your **High School Activities Resumes**. EducationQuest.org and Nebraska Career Connections have great templates, along with Microsoft Word/Google Doc. <u>These are very useful when apply-</u><u>ing for scholarships</u>. Instead of writing everything out, you can print "see attached resume." The sooner you create a resume, the less you will have to remember your senior year. If you need any help or want to look at examples, Miss Hoffman is available and has previous year resumes.

As this is an overview of what to look forward to this year, please read every month in the newsletter under Counselor's Corner. There will be updated information for parents and students to follow as they navigate through high school.


